

Reach \$1M Annually



The mission of the Children's Environmental Health Institute is to support initiatives to improve children's environmental health with an emphasis on their microenvironment.








Citizen's Environmental Coalition's mission is to foster dialogue, education, and collaboration on environmental issues in the Houston & Gulf Coast region.














The Center for Maximum Potential Building Systems, established in 1975, is a non-profit education, research, and demonstration organization specializing in life cycle planning and design.
