

### **AMPLIFY**

We amplify our members' initiatives to expand their mission and reach more communities through awareness building. We do this through blogging, sharing their events, and developing awareness campaigns such as #MyEarthMyTexas.



We amplify our members' missions by sharing their stories. We highlight how communities and individuals can engage with our members and the environment. Engagement includes participating in events, like San Marcos River Foundation's Kayak Cleanups or Treefolks' NeighborWoods Program (which gives away 5000 trees annually). Our blog also features quarterly member highlights!



With the help of businesses and nonprofit members, we expanded on our #MyEarthMyTexas campaign so more eco-conscious citizens can do their part and connect with others who create daily change on individual and community levels.





### CONNECT

EarthShare Texas recognizes how diverse connections result in more holistic and effective community opportunities and solutions. We connect our nonprofits and business partners with the goal of facilitating knowledge sharing and capacity building.

When our members combine the proper appropriate talent, their resources and missions flourish. We help our members put these two pieces together by holding quarterly webinars, roundtables, and other capacity building opportunities for nonprofits to connect, share ideas, and learn from others. We utilize outside experts and educators to help members grow internally, creating stronger and more inclusive workplace cultures: and externally, implementing lasting, local change in Texas communities.

### **Texas Sustainability Challenge**

Our new program, the Texas Sustainability Challenge, sought to connect 130+ employees to our nonprofit members and encourage sustainability-focused behavior change.

#### **Advocacy 101**

Co-hosted by EarthShare Texas and Bolder Advocacy, we coach nonprofits on advocacy work to catalyze nonprofit engagement in the policy making process.

### **Unconcious Bias Training**

We partnered with SPARK Equity in Action to provide a two-day workshop for our member organizations. More than 60 nonprofit staff and leadership attended.



### **EMPOWER**

From payroll giving to partnering with companies for cause-marketing campaigns, we empower our nonprofit members by supplying sustainable, unrestricted funding. Our fundraising efforts are always evolving and we welcome new collaborators.



#### H-E-B TEARPAD CAMPAIGN

H-E-B needed a way to ensure the environmental well-being of the communities who depend on their products. With the Earth Month tear pad campaign, all H-E-B (and Central Market) customers can add \$1, \$3, \$5, or \$10 to their purchase, both in store and online. The donations help members pursue environmental initiatives (from air to water quality, habitat cleanups and restorations, and much more) all across Texas. Our cause marketing campaign with H-E-B has run since 2007 and has raised \$1.5 million.

#### RELIANT ECOSHARE™

Reliant EcoShare<sup>sM</sup> creates a proactive partnership between the customer's consumption and conservation. Since 2011 this state-wide program available to all Reliant customers has raised more than \$2 million and grows monthly. Customers can help make a change simply by paying their bill.

### **OUR SUCCESS**

In 2022, EarthShare Texas hit many milestones. We celebrated three decades of environmental collaboration with our 30 Year Anniversary Bash at Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. With this single event, and with the support of generous Texas donors, we fundraised \$47,691.63. These funds and others will help propel EarthShare Texas as we expand our outreach and capabilities to meet the needs of our members.

### **Sneak Peak: Fellows Program**

Headed by our executive director, EarthShare Texas is collaborating with college students, the City of Austin, and nonprofit members to create an environmental fellowship pilot program.

### **Dual Problems**

**Capacity Pains:** Nonprofit organizations struggle to deepen and expand their missions due to staff burnout, high turnover, and difficulty to afford talent.

**Systemic Racism:** BIPOC and low income communities are disproportionately impacted by climate change, and are historically excluded from public green spaces.

### **The Solution**

The program pairs students of color with current members for experience in the nonprofit and environmental sector in Texas, with wraparound mentorship and diversity, equity, and inclusion services for participating student and nonprofits.

### **Our Members' Success**

Greens Bayou Coalition: Our Kayaking for Kids program, implemented in 2014 to introduce children from at-risk groups to kayaking and the ecology of the bayou system ... will be restarted this year. Our Greens Bayou Paddle Trail Committee is meeting again... developing a 27.5 mile Texas Paddling Trail.

Sierra Club Foundation: Reducing coal pollution in Texas. In 2021, the Gibbons Creek plant, owned by four public utilities, was not only permanently retired but demolished, leaving Texas with only 14 coal plants, down from a total of 19 just a few years ago. Sierra Club played a big part in educating utility customers and community members about the negative impacts of coal, and continues to do similar work in cities across Texas.

Austin Youth River Watch: During the last year, River Watchers collectively spent 1,600+ hours immersed in outdoor programming including 52 environmental restoration projects and 21 different water quality activities. Throughout these projects, students collectively removed 215 lbs of trash from local waterways, planted 134 native trees, 107 native grasses and 160 seedballs.

Keep Texas Beautiful: \$15,000 provides trash bags for cleanups for an entire year and helps remove over 3 million pounds of litter from Texas roadways, waterways, trails, and green spaces.



Several of our members focus on building public support for conservation, clean water, and climate and environmental justice. They represent the frontline for environmental policy change in Texas and building a more inclusive community.























BikeTexas advances bicycle access, safety, and education. We encourage and promote bicycling, increased safety, and improved conditions. We unite and inspire people and provide a cohesive voice for people who ride bikes in Texas.



Environmental Defense Fund's mission is to preserve the natural systems on which all life depends. Guided by science and economics, we find practical and lasting solutions to the most serious environmental problems.



Public Citizen advocates for a healthier and more equitable world by making government work for the people and by defending democracy from corporate greed.

The mission of Keep Texas Beautiful is to inspire and empower Texans to keep our communities clean and beautiful.
















The Center for Maximum Potential Building Systems, established in 1975, is a non-profit education, research, and demonstration organization specializing in life cycle planning and design.
